








2.0 Pilot Sites



A total of 138 TGB farmers actively participated in the pilot phase of the project from 2003 to 2007, aligning with the requirements of the Plan Vivo Standard to ensure the project's conformity to the standard's specifications. The study conducted by the Rainforest Alliance, which oversaw the audit, confirmed the project's compliance with Plan Vivo Standards and requirements. This validation encompassed the project design document, as well as the verification of implementation and performance since its inception in 2003. Covering 258 hectares of land within the boundaries of Bushenyi District in South Western Uganda, this comprehensive validation and verification audit focused on the sub-counties of Bitereko, Kiyanga, Ryeru, Kichambwa, and Bunyaruguru in Bushenyi District.












3.0 Bitereko Women's Group

3.1 Bitereko's Women Mobilisers

TGB in Bitereko was introduced by a group of charismatic women under their organization -Bitereko Womens' group. They were inspired to have men join their otherwise women organization since many of their members were facing a challenge of their husbands demanding a share in the carbon income. They reasoned that by allowing men to join the program, they are able to help their husbands understand the goals and objectives of the project and either join as individuals or jointly manage the land that has been recruited in the names of the wife. By the end of the pilot phase, the Bitereko group accounted for a third of the participating farmers with 24 women and 18 men. It is out of the lessons learned from this group that the project took a whole household approach.


Sustenance and Shelter: Trees as Providers

Long before the concept of carbon payments, Wilson had a passion for growing trees, initially introduced to the idea by John Tagawa, a staff member of the District Forestry Services. Eager to expand his tree-growing endeavors, Wilson enthusiastically joined the TGB project when ECOTRUST entered the scene.



Strategic Planning and Tree Cultivation

Wilson's journey has been meticulously planned, beginning with the planting of 100 trees on one plot and later adding 800 more to another. He nurtured these trees to maturity, and through a combination of carbon payments and strategic harvests, he has earned over UGX 60 million. The tree branches have served multiple purposes, providing firewood and material for charcoal baking.

Local and International Recognition

Beyond financial gains, Wilson has gained exposure and recognition locally and internationally. He actively participated in monitoring and exchange visits with fellow farmers and project coordinators. Notably, he represented TGB in Mexico, where he became the first international speaker, highlighting the integration of various livelihood activities into tree growing.

Advocacy for Diversified Income Sources

Recognizing the need for diversified income sources, Wilson advocated for activities like beekeeping and livestock farming alongside tree growing. His mobilization skills were evident as he enlisted farmers from other subcounties and played a crucial role in establishing the Collaborative Forest Management Group (NNTG) for the conservation of Kalinzu Forest Reserve in collaboration with the National Forestry Authority (NFA).


Financial Support for Church Projects



As the project unfolded, Nazarius began to receive carbon payments, which he predominantly allocated to the maintenance of his growing forest. Concurrently, he continued cultivating pine trees for more immediate income, recognizing the longer maturity period of the indigenous species. Over time, he allowed the forest to develop its undergrowth, transforming the landscape into a semblance of a natural forest.

Anticipation of Harvest

Now, Nazarius eagerly awaits the full maturity of his trees, envisioning a harvest that will yield income through timber sales. Post-harvest, his plan is to replant more trees on the same land, perpetuating the cycle of sustainable forestry. Having witnessed the success and benefits derived by many from tree growing, Nazarius advocates for individuals with available land to embrace tree cultivation as a long-term investment, not only for personal gain but for the prosperity of future generations.



4.4 CFM groups in Bunyaruguru









Challenges in Kalinzu Forest Reserve (2000-2012)

In the early 2000s, the Kalinzu forest reserve faced severe deforestation, driven by unsustainable practices, particularly by the The Ndangara and Nyakiyanja Parishes Tutungukye (NNTG) group. Comprising individuals who relied on tree felling and wildlife poaching for their livelihoods, this group often found themselves in confrontations with the National Forestry Authority (NFA), playfully referring to the NFA rangers as 'Baboons.' Innocent Byamukama, a member of the NNTG, humorously reminisced about those challenging times, sharing stories of pooling funds to secure the release of members apprehended by the NFA.

Transformation Through Trees for Global Benefits (2012-2013)

The turning point for the NNTG arrived in 2012 with the introduction of the Trees for Global Benefit (TGB) Programme to Rubirizi District by ECOTRUST. Collaborative negotiations with the NFA led to a comprehensive agreement in 2013, marking the beginning of a transformative journey. ECOTRUST designed a forward-thinking forest management plan that involved planting eucalyptus trees in outer forest regions to meet the needs of the neighboring Ndangara community for firewood. Simultaneously, inner forest sections underwent reforestation with indigenous tree species, providing the community with payments for environmental services (PES) earned from carbon sequestration.

Community Collaboration and Reforestation Efforts (2012-2019)

Facing significant poverty and limited infrastructure, the Ndangara community embraced the collaboration between NNTG, ECOTRUST, and the NFA. Between 2012 and 2019, the NNTG reforested approximately 380 hectares with indigenous trees under the TGB Programme. Each member received a designated land parcel within the forest for tree planting. The introduction of eucalyptus buffers around the forest provided a crucial source of firewood, reducing the need to venture deeper into the forest reserve.

Success in Firewood Supply and Economic Impact (2017-2023)


The NNTG's success story continued as they planted 300 hectares of eucalyptus trees, securing a contract with Kyamuhunga tea company in 2017 to supply firewood for tea leaf seasoning. Today, the group annually provides approximately 4,000 metric tons of firewood, generating earnings exceeding 200 million shillings. These funds have significantly improved household incomes and overall living standards.

The Buzenga CFM group is located in Ryeru sub-county, Rubirizi, and is working with the NFA to conserve the Kashyoha-Kitomi (KK) Forest Reserve. The group has a membership of just over 280 community members, some of whom are also TGB farmers. In addition to their CFM activities, the group boasts a robust savings and credit scheme, an apiary enterprise, and vegetable farming.

With support from ECOTRUST, the group is currently reviewing their CFM agreement with NFA to include carbon rights for the indigenous trees planted within the forest reserve.



Comprising dedicated TGB carbon farmers collaborating with the National Forestry Authority (NFA), their primary focus is the conservation of the Kashoya-Kitomi (KK) Forest Reserve. Beyond environmental efforts, the group operates a robust savings and credit scheme, and certain members are engaged in additional ventures such as vegetable cultivation and beekeeping. Among the group's notable pioneers are farmers like Nazarius, Eric Katemba, and Kamusiime. Their collective efforts have successfully restored over 200 hectares, encompassing bo eucalyptus and indigenous tree species.

Meet Bushoborozi Benon, a leader in the Trees for Global Benefits (TGB) project since 2003. Originally from Kirama Village in Kiyanja subcounty, Mitooma District, Benon's story is a testament to the positive impact of tree planting and sustainable living. He started by cutting timber illegally but shifted to championing environmental conservation and community development through the TGB project.



Benon's Story:

Benon and four fellow farmers initially engaged in illegal timber cutting within the national park. The daily pursuit by park rangers led them to shift their focus to cultivating trees using seeds from the forest. ECOTRUST recognized their efforts and began supporting them through carbon payments, marking the beginning of their journey towards sustainable livelihoods.

Community Engagement:

Inspired by ECOTRUST's support, Benon rallied his community for tree planting training sessions, ensuring the involvement of future generations. The impact of these initiatives extended beyond environmental conservation, fostering friendships and community development.

Educational Empowerment:

Using carbon payments, Benon supported his wife's education, enabling her to rise from Senior 3 to a District Sub-county Officer (DSO) for Kiyanga Subcounty. The ripple effect continued as their children pursued various educational paths, breaking the cycle of limited opportunities.

Diversification and Entrepreneurship:

ECOTRUST's business development trainings opened doors to new opportunities. Benon diversified his ventures by learning to make banana wine and establishing beekeeping with 30 hives, yielding 90 liters of honey per harvest. These ventures not only increased his income but also contributed to the ecological balance.


Celebrating Achievements:

Home Construction and Thinning:



Diversified Agricultural Ventures:



Daudi vividly remembers the ripple effect originating in Bitereko Subcounty, spreading throughout the district. Carbon payments, unexpected yet welcome, reached him, amounting to approximately UGX 400,000. His dedication to the project persisted, and he celebrated Beatrice's international recognition, attending conferences in Europe on carbon projects. Despite some early setbacks due to misinformation, Daudi observed the majority benefiting over the years.

Harvesting Success and Building a Legacy

Having harvested mature trees, Daudi derived income from timber and building poles, retaining a few in his plot. His wife, too, maintains all her trees, allowing them to flourish. Daudi firmly believes in the project's transformative impact on the community, lifting many out of poverty.

Celebrating 20 Years of TGB:


